The Tokyo Games, which will bring the world's top athletes together, is a mammoth project made even more complicated by the pandemic. Here are some key figures to note:

The final budget for the postponed Games. The one-year delay caused expenses to balloon by **US\$2.8 billion**, which covers costs from staff retention to new infection prevention measures.

Virus tests a day. Athletes will be tested every day for the coronavirus, with confirmed positive cases not allowed to compete and placed in hotel isolation or hospital.

Beds made by Japanese bedding company Airweave for athletes at the Olympic Village, **8,000** of which will be repurposed for next month's Paralympics.

of items and goods procured for the Games can be expected to be reused or recycled. These include some **65,000** computers, tablets and other IT and consumer appliances, as well as **19,000** office desks, chairs and other fixtures, which will be used and then passed on.

6.21 million

Old phones donated by the Japanese public. The **5,000** gold, silver and bronze medals at the Tokyo Games are made entirely from recycled metal – extracted from nearly **79,000** tons of used consumer electronics including laptops, games consoles and digital cameras.



40,000

Pieces of timber, donated by **63** Japanese municipal governments, used in the building of the Olympic Village Plaza. Each piece is marked with the area that supplied the wood. When the Games end, they will be used elsewhere.

48,000

Meals expected to be served at the Olympic Village each day.



700

Menu options for diners at the Olympic Village. The cuisine is classified as Western, Japanese and Asian, which covers Chinese, Indian and Vietnamese options.

\$621,000

Starting price of a condominium unit at the Olympic Village. After the Games, the condominiums, located in Tokyo's Harumi area, will be converted into ordinary apartment buildings.



160,000

Condoms given out by organisers to athletes, who are supposed to bring them back to their own countries to support awareness about HIV/AIDS.
